## SENATOR McCAIN'S RATINGS SOAR IN ARIZONA – SENATOR KYL'S RATINGS RISE AS WELL

Phoenix, Arizona, July 28, 2004. Only once in the period from 1991 to today has U.S. Senator John McCain had favorable job ratings that crossed the 70 percent mark, but they have done so again today. Fully 72 percent of Arizonans say he is doing an “excellent” or “good” job in Washington. When McCain recently scotched rampant media speculation that he might consider joining the Democrat ticket, the few disgruntled Republicans who had taken the rumors seriously rejoined the fold of McCain admirers. Today, an astonishing 78 percent of Republicans, 66 percent of Democrats and 69 percent of Independent voters give John McCain favorable job ratings.

U.S. Senator Jon Kyl has also moved up in job approval, now at 48 percent favorable to only nine percent unfavorable. These are his best overall job ratings over the last 12 months and his second highest ratings in two years.

The findings outlined in this report are based on a survey of 701 adults, including 515 registered voters, across Arizona conducted between July 1<sup>st</sup> and July 8<sup>th</sup>, 2004, by the Behavior Research Center of Arizona as part of the Center's independent and non-partisan Rocky Mountain Poll series. 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EDITOR'S NOTE: This Rocky Mountain Poll Arizona (2004-III-08) is based on 701 telephone interviews with adults, including 515 registered voters, conducted from July 1<sup>st</sup> through July 8<sup>th</sup>, 2004 throughout Arizona. In the overall sample, one may say with 95 percent certainty that the results have a statistical precision of plus or minus 3.8 percent of what they would have been had the entire adult population been surveyed. The voter sample has an estimated margin of error of plus or minus 4.4. The Rocky Mountain Poll is conducted by the Behavior Research Center of Arizona and is an independent and non-partisan research program.
