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ARIZONA: HALF SAY AMERICA ON "ROAD TO RUIN"
ONLY 13 % PLAN TO SUPPORT INCUMBENTS

Phoenix, Arizona, **October 30, 2013** For the first time in our memory and in sharp contrast to more optimistic views held in 1999, a majority of Arizonans now believe *America is on the road to ruin*. Today, just 27 percent believe America "is headed for a new and better future." In 1999, half of the public held this more optimistic view.

The increasingly sour view that voters have of the direction political leaders are giving the nation carries over to how voters may vote in 2014. Thus barely 13 percent say they plan to vote to re-install current office holders in the US congress while a whopping 55 percent say they plan to vote incumbents out of office in favor of new blood. And while this general view transcends all political sub-groups, it spikes to 69 percent among political independents and 64 percent among GOP voters. Democrat office holders also have little to crow about as 59 percent of their rank and file members also plan to vote against incumbents.

Conventional political wisdom has it that even though voters often display disapproval toward Congress, yet when elections roll around, they will stick with their party and incumbents. 2014 may be different however, because of both the intensity of the sentiment and because voters view the Congress as having pursued partisan brinkmanship tactics and policies that hurt recovery, hit the consumer in the pocket book and may have hurt U.S. prestige in the international community. National polls have shown that even though the public has deep questions about Obama's health care program, they strongly disapprove of successful efforts by some in the GOP to shut down the government as a way of showing their opposition to the program.

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These findings may also explain why a long term Arizona incumbent facing re-election such as U.S. Senator John McCain is vigorously trying to put some distance between himself and the politics of the extreme right wing of his political party. McCain has been openly critical of the Tea Party wing of the GOP for pursuing politics designed to create crisis such as trying to stop Obama health care reform by shutting down the government during a slow economic recovery and via threats to block debt ceiling increases.

Belief that America is on the road to ruin is uniquely high among registered Republicans (62%), Independents (61%) rural residents (59%) and among Caucasians (59%). These groups tend to also be those most likely to vote against incumbents in 2014.

EDITOR'S NOTE: This Rocky Mountain Poll - Arizona (2013-IV-01), is based on 702 interviews with heads of household statewide including 438 registered voters statewide, conducted between October 17 and October 25, 2013. Interviewing was conducted in both English or Spanish by professional interviewers of the Behavior Research Center on both landlines and cell phones. Where necessary, figures for age, sex, race and political party were weighted to bring them into line with their actual proportion in the population. In a sample of this size, one can say with a 95 percent certainty that the results have a statistical precision of plus or minus 3.8 percent of what they would have been had the entire population been surveyed and 4.8 percent had the entire voter population been surveyed. The Rocky Mountain Poll is conducted by the Behavior Research Center of Arizona and is an independent and non-partisan research program sponsored by the Center.
