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## **U.S. SENATE RACE IN ARIZONA: ANN KIRKPATRICK IN DEAD HEAT WITH JOHN McCAIN**

Phoenix, Arizona, April 15, 2016. Incumbent U.S. Senator John McCain is locked in a dead heat with Democrat Ann Kirkpatrick as both receive 42 percent of a test vote taken statewide in April. This leaves only 16 percent undecided as of the time of this survey, compared to 25 percent in January.

It also appears that at least one traditional voting pattern is changing in Arizona. For many years, rural voters have tended to lean Republican in most races, but in 2016 Kirkpatrick is outpolling McCain by 43 to 39 percent in the state's rural counties in a modest but important pattern we have noticed since January. To date, McCain seems to be running a low-key campaign, perhaps in an effort to not be drawn out about who he prefers in the primary elections for President. Whatever the reason, Senator McCain appears to have opened the door for Kirkpatrick to make gains with voters.

The findings outlined in this report are based on a statewide survey of 564 registered voters. It was conducted between April 4 and 11, 2016 by the Behavior Research Center of Arizona and is part of the Center's Independent and non-partisan Rocky Mountain Poll Series. The deeply partisan and bitter GOP presidential primary elections, plus McCain playing a low-key role, may be having an impact on voting patterns in Arizona. Thus, compared to January of this year, support for McCain among registered Republicans has slumped from 59 to 51 percent today and 27 percent are defecting to Kirkpatrick. Republicans are the most undecided about how to vote in the U.S. Senate race (22%, compared to 16% among Democrats and only 12% among Independents.)

In contrast, among registered Democrat voters, 49 percent favored Kirkpatrick in January but that number has swollen to 59 percent today. Independent voters are divided fairly closely with 47 percent going for McCain while 41 percent favor Kirkpatrick.

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Hispanic voters may yet turn out to be an island of strength for John McCain as he is currently garnering 50 percent of their vote compared to only 32 percent in January. Kirkpatrick has lost some ground among Hispanic voters (39% in January to 37% today). Non-Hispanic minority voters are splitting heavily for Kirkpatrick (66% to 19%).

Finally, when it comes to gender and age, the survey finds that 35 to 54 year olds tend to favor McCain while older voters are giving their nod to Kirkpatrick; voters under 35 are split. And while men split 49 to 34 percent for McCain, women return the favor by favoring Kirkpatrick by 47 to 37 percent.

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**EDITOR'S NOTE:** This Rocky Mountain Poll - Arizona (2016-II-01), is based on 564 interviews with Arizona registered voters conducted between April 4 and April 11, 2016. Interviewing was conducted in both English and Spanish by professional interviewers of the Behavior Research Center on both land lines and cell phones. Where necessary, figures for age, sex, and race were weighted to bring them into line with their actual proportion in the population. In a sample of this size, one can say with a 95 percent certainty that the results have a statistical precision of plus or minus 4.2 percent of what they would have been had the entire adult voter population been surveyed. The Rocky Mountain Poll is conducted by the Behavior Research Center of Arizona and is an independent and non-partisan research program sponsored by the Center.
